



COURSE OBJECTIVES:

This course is designed to acquaint the students with the framework of Industrial relations in our country. Before 2020, there were 40 central acts on labour. All existing laws are consolidated into New four labour code, 2020. This course covers two codes that are, Industrial Relations Code, 2020 and Code on Wages, 2020. The code streamlines the laws related to trade unions, employment conditions for industries, and a comprehensive handling of industrial disputes. There is also a higher emphasis on building a strong employer-employee relationship, creating better working conditions, collective bargaining, and reskilling employees. Further, the importance of the maintenance of Industrial peace and efforts to reduce the incidence of Strikes and Lockout and Industrial Strike is to be emphasized. The

main theme underlying the course is to critically understand the provisions of the Trade Unions, the types of machinery contemplated under the provisions of the Industrial Disputes Act for the prevention and settlement of industrial disputes. The Industrial Relations Code of 2020 is a comprehensive set of laws that covers a wide range of provisions related to the rights and responsibilities of employers and workers. The students are to be acquainted with the provisions of striks, lockouts, grievance redressal mechanism, standing orders, Negotiating council, closure, layoff, retrenchment etc. Further, the Code on Wages, 2020 aims to regulate the payment of wage and bonus in all employments where any industry, trade, business, or manufacture is carried out. The students are to be acquainted with the different types of wages like, minimum ages, living wages, fair wages, social framework prevailing in our country.

COURSE OUTCOMES:

After completing this course students should be able to:

- 1. Interpret the provisions relating to Industrial relations, social security and working conditions and to enquire about the procedural and industrial discipline in present establishments,
- 2. Outline the legal provisions and concepts of Lay-Off and Lock-Out, Retrenchment, Strike, Wages and Workman,
- 3. Outline / inspect the important causes & impact of industrial disputes, the provisions relating to health, safety and welfare of the workers,
- 4. Explain the standards and techniques of Collective Bargaining,

- 6. Analyse the technicalities and concepts of industrial dispute and apply the relevant provisions of law into practise,
